# Time to Start Thinking About the MG Plant Sale

Our MG Plant Sale is scheduled for May 9<sup>th</sup>. Due to the renovating/roofing work occurring at the UTREC we will be unable to have our sale there. We will return to the Madison County Agriculture Complex Auditorium at 309 N Parkway. The sale will be from 7:00 AM until noon. We will be receiving plants for the sale and setting up on Thursday and Friday, May 7 and 8.

This change will require us to be very efficient in the use of space as we will have a smaller area for the sale. In order to make it possible for shoppers to be able to park near the sale, Master Gardeners are asked to park across the street at the Board of Education. We will also try to assist shoppers with parking by having a parking crew to direct traffic and keep up with where spaces have become available.

One of the key ways that you can help with the sale is by sharing the news that we will not be at UTREC this year but at the Extension Office on Parkway. We will have publicity about our location but hearing about the change from several sources will help prevent confusion. We will have flyers for you to distribute at the April meeting.

If you have not participated in the sale before (new MGs and Interns), this is our fundraiser for our local organization. These plants are ones that MGs have grown, nurtured, rooted, or dug from their own gardens to sell to the public. In this way, we seek to provide plants that we know will survive and thrive in W. Tennessee gardens. As perennials are emerging from the ground, it is a good time to dig up and divide plants that need to be divided or that are ready to share as “pass alongs”. Plants need some time after being dug to settle into pots, survive the shock and begin to grow and look really great. Please remember that your pots should arrive for the sale clean, neat, and weed-free. Each plant will also carry a label with the name of the plant and information about how to care for it. If you will let Mary Kay Havranek ([mkretired08@gmail.com](mailto:mkretired08@gmail.com) or 731-784-4848) know what plants and how many of each you are bringing, she will print labels for you. She has most of these plants already in her computer with the research done so all she has to do is print them off for you. The labels will be waiting when you deliver your plants. If you do not send her your list, you are responsible for doing your own plant labels. We will need printed labels put on the plants before we price them.

Remember to save your boxes. We will need lots of boxes. The boxes need to be sturdy but not very deep. You may drop off your boxes when you drop off your plants.

If you have a wagon or something similar that might be used to transport plants between the sale and cars, we would like to borrow it. Please put a label on it and have it here for us by 1:00 pm on Thursday, May 7. Please note that wagons will not be allowed inside the auditorium this year! Due to the small space we will have and the large crowd, it will be too dangerous to have people pulling wagons inside the building.

Sign-up sheets for the sale will be available at the April meeting. We will need adder teams, transporters, parking crew, holding area volunteers, greeters, and likely others. Sign-up sheets will have a description of what the job entails. If you cannot lift or don't like to add, please don't sign up for that particular job. In addition, we will need volunteers to help with set-up for the sale and clean-up after the sale, receiving plants for the sale, assisting with pricing, and putting plants in the proper location.

We will keep you posted with the information you need via email and or newsletter. 
Hello Master Gardeners,

**Banquet:** Carol and I found the combination of our golden anniversary and the MG 20 year anniversary/award banquet to be a wonderful occasion. The decorations and program seemed better than they have ever been. Thank you to all who helped make this event happen. Congratulations to the Bobbit's, our master gardeners of the year. This was a well- deserved honor!

**Clivia:** The clivia I brought to the banquet for distribution are shade plants which will take little if any frost. They prefer cool very dry winters and make spikes of orange flowers in the spring. I got this clone from my father's estate when he died in March of 2000 and divided a massive plant into 14 smaller plants last spring. Mine spend the summer outside. They may not flower until 2016.

**Plant sale plants:** I am looking forward to signs of growth in the apparently empty pots in my cold frames. There are between 200 and 300 plants there which are hopefully sleeping. I have put the lids back on the cold frames and will keep them closed until it gets considerably warmer unless the sun comes out in which case the frames will need to be opened.

It seems that while lenton roses do well if transplanted in the fall or the spring they do not like to be transplanted during the winter. I suspect that the soil is too cool at this time for new root growth even on plants where shoot growth occurs at very low temperatures such as lenton roses. They may look better when it finally warms up. My Thai giants are struggling badly. Only a few made it last year. Only a few are needed considering the size they grow to be.

**Weather:** What will survive the next storm? That depends on what we really get. Yesterday morning the weather channel said an inch of show Monday followed by 7 degrees Wednesday night. By last night they were at 100% chance of 5-8 inches of snow and 3 degrees Wed. This morning they say 25 degrees and freezing rain followed by 3 below zero. They obviously don't know any more than you or I know. Snow acts like a warm blanket and protects the plants when it is really cold. If we get any, that is. An ice storm on the other hand... I bet there isn't a quart of milk or loaf of bread left on a store shelf in West Tennessee tonight. This is why we mulched tender perennials heavily last fall as we do every fall! I have personally learned my lesson and will no longer be planting anything other than annuals in the ground unless it is hardy to zone 6! Yes, I know we are in zone 7 but the weather seems to no longer know it.

**Spring:** I have tomatoes, peppers and Swiss chard coming up in the sun room. They will be set into individual pots in two weeks and then the tomatoes and peppers will grow slowly for 2 months before being set into the garden. I have a new covered bed underway for the Swiss

chard. It is time to plant English peas. Well, maybe not this year... We had crocuses flowering with the lenton roses and the first daffodils for Valentine's Day. Will most of them freeze off again this year? They will if it gets as cold as it is forecast to get.

**Do now:** Plant English peas, spinach, onions and the other cool season seed and transplants as soon as we get a few warm days. Plant tomato and pepper seed for transplants immediately. Make final plans for the spring garden and purchase needed supplies. I, for example, just acquired a maximum-minimum recording thermometer for my 6 X 6 foot popup greenhouse.

David and I wish to thank all of the Master Gardeners who shared in our 50th celebration of our life's adventurous journey. It was truly memorable. We want to thank Joan Hughes for making such a beautiful setting for our cake. We also want to thank Mary Kay Havranek and Francis Bobbitt for graciously being our cake servers.

Jason's pussywillow bouquet was a very thoughtful gift some of which will end up somewhere on our property. We will treasure each one.

We look forward to spending many more fun filled years with the Master Gardener organization and all the lovely people associated with it. Thank You

ComeUnity Cafe's urban garden manager Cari Phillips in partnership with Master Gardeners, and Library Director Dinah Harris, are starting a local Seed Sharing Library at the Jackson Madison County Public Library this Spring! This concept is catching on all around the country, with the closest one being in Nashville. The way it works is as simple as the concept of checking out a book. A large amount of seeds have been donated and will be organized into categories ranked from easiest to hardest to grow. A station will be set up in the library with available resources for people to check out along with their seeds. We'll have books, pamphlets, and instructional guides to help those who may be starting seeds for the first time. Anyone with a library card can "check out" seeds to use in their home gardens. The seeds obviously do not have to be returned, but we will teach and encourage others to save seeds from their harvest to give back to the library and the community. We will also offer a variety of classes taught by local professionals to help further educate others on the art of growing your own food. The seed library's goals are to encourage the age old traditions of passing down heirloom seeds, to help others grow their way out of hunger through vegetable gardening, and to facilitate community education in organic gardening, sustainability, and environmental stewardship.

We are also looking for home gardeners who often have excess produce, who would be willing to pass on that extra produce to people in need. We can use any garden, big or small! In conjunction with the seed library, we are developing a produce donation network called Jackson Harvest Share, which will connect local gardeners to relief organizations around the city. These organizations will use the produce to benefit the community in a variety of ways. As soon as all the details are all worked out, a spreadsheet will be developed that will provide a contact number/place/day/time where the produce can be delivered for each organization. Let us know if you'd be interested in occasionally donating produce through our program, or if you'd be interested in growing an extra row, plant, or pot for the community. We want to spread health and wellness from local produce all around the city, especially to those who don't always have access to it! We'd love to hear from you.
